FACT SHEET

- Project Title:** 2016 County-Initiated GMA Comprehensive Plan Amendments – GPP 10 Growth Target Reconciliation
- Proposed Non-Project Action:** The proposed non-project action is the adoption of amendments to Appendix D - Growth Targets and Map 3 - Municipal Urban Growth Area (MUGA) of the Snohomish County GMA Comprehensive Plan General Policy Plan (GPP), and adoption of updates to the Snohomish County UGA Land Capacity Analysis Technical Report (June 10, 2015), as result of the growth target reconciliation process through Snohomish County Tomorrow (SCT).
- Purpose of the EIS Addendum:** This addendum adds information relating to the non-project programmatic county action described above. This information does not change the analysis of previously identified significant impacts of the alternatives to the county's GMA Comprehensive Plan – General Policy Plan within the SEPA documents dated September 8, 2014, (Draft EIS) and June 3, 2015, (Final EIS).
- This addendum is being issued in accordance with WAC 197-11-625 and WAC 197-11-630. The adopted environmental documents listed herein, together with this addendum, meet Snohomish County's environmental review needs for the current proposal.
- Description of Proposal:** The proposed amendments to the GMA Comprehensive Plan Appendix D and Map 3 - Municipal Urban Growth Area (MUGA), and the updates to the Snohomish County UGA Land Capacity Analysis Technical Report, are considered as part of the annual county-initiated Comprehensive Plan Updates. These amendments are identified as GPP10 – Growth Target Reconciliation and are intended to reflect the outcome of the recently completed Snohomish County Tomorrow (SCT) growth target reconciliation process.
- Growth Target Amendments to Appendix D
- Following adoption of updated GMA plans, Countywide Planning Policy (CPP) GF-5 requires SCT to engage in a growth target reconciliation process to review discrepancies between city and county adopted targets contained in the local GMA plans, and to recommend a set of reconciled population, housing and employment targets to the County Council for adoption into Appendix B of the CPPs.
- On April 27, 2016, SCT Steering Committee recommended to the County Council several relatively minor amendments to the 2035 growth targets. The SCT recommendation included a reassignment of the relatively minor population and housing target shortfalls for four small cities (Brier, Gold

Bar, Granite Falls and Snohomish) to their associated unincorporated UGA or MUGA where adequate capacity existed. The total population capacity shortfall amounted to only 425 persons, a very small number compared with the total projected 2035 countywide population of 955,257. The total number of housing units associated with this population capacity shortfall is 174.

The SCT reconciled target recommendation does not significantly alter the county's consistency with the PSRC's VISION 2040 RGS. The RGS, which is intended to shift the distribution of future population growth more towards cities with regional growth centers – metropolitan (Everett) and core cities (Lynnwood, Bothell) – and less in the unincorporated UGA than has been the case in the past, was used to guide the 2035 growth allocation process for the 2015 GMA plan updates. The reconciled population targets recommended by SCT shifts only two-tenths of one percent of the 2011-2035 countywide population growth share from small cities to the unincorporated UGA, as can be seen below:

Meadowdale Gap Resolution

The SCT recommendation also included amendments to the MUGA growth target tables and map (Map 3) to reflect updated city boundary reference information and the recent Meadowdale Gap agreement between the cities of Lynnwood and Mukilteo. This agreement entailed removal of the Meadowdale Gap area from the tables and map, and the reassignment of the entire former gap area to the Lynnwood unincorporated MUGA.

UGA Land Capacity Analysis Technical Report Updates

The 2035 reconciled growth targets recommended by SCT did not include resolution of the Arlington UGA growth target issues. At the time of the SCT recommendation, final 2035 growth targets for the City of Arlington

and its unincorporated UGA were unresolved due to differences in future density assumptions used by city and county staff in estimating additional residential capacity as part of the processing of the City of Arlington's Docket XVII proposal (ARL3) with the county. Since the SCT target reconciliation recommendation, the City of Arlington has requested that the ARL3 proposal be withdrawn from the county's docket. The city indicates that it can accommodate the adopted 2035 growth targets within their current UGA boundaries through consideration of reasonable measures to increase capacity within the city. These measures include a combination of higher residential densities and mixed-uses in specific areas.

City residential capacity estimates have been revised by the City of Arlington and are shown in the updated summary tables to the Snohomish County UGA Land Capacity Analysis Technical Report, originally adopted by the County Council on June 10, 2015. These updated summary tables show that the City of Arlington and its unincorporated UGA can accommodate the 2035 population and housing unit targets currently adopted in Appendix D of the county's GPP. The updated land capacity summary tables also show the minor population and housing capacity adjustments recommended by SCT for the four cities described previously.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

Overview:

The adoption of amendments to the GMA Comprehensive Plan is a non-project action under the Washington State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). This Addendum is not intended to satisfy individual project action SEPA requirements (the review needed for a future site-specific land use or building permit application). This Addendum does not significantly change the analysis of impacts and alternatives contained in the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) prepared in 2015 for the Comprehensive Plan 2015 Update, nor does it identify new or significantly different impacts.

Prior Environmental Review

The county issued a Draft EIS for the county's Comprehensive Plan 2015 Update on September 8, 2014, and issued a Final EIS on June 3, 2015. The elements of the environment addressed in both of these EIS documents included elements of both the natural and built environment: earth, air, water, plants and animals, land and shoreline use, population and employment, cultural resources, transportation, energy, public services, and utilities.

EIS Addendum

According to the SEPA Rules, an Addendum to an EIS provides additional analysis and/or information about a proposal or alternatives where their significant environmental impacts have been disclosed and identified in a previous environmental document (WAC 197-11-600(3)(b)(ii)). An Addendum is appropriate when the impacts of the new proposal are the same general types as those identified in the prior document, and when the new analysis does not substantially change the analysis of significant impacts and alternatives identified in the prior environmental documents (WAC 197-11-600(4)(e), WAC 197-11-706).

This Addendum to the Comprehensive Plan 2015 Update EIS is being issued pursuant to WAC 197-11-625 to meet the County's SEPA responsibility. The Comprehensive Plan 2015 Update EIS evaluated plan alternatives and impacts that encompass the same general policy direction, land use patterns, and environmental impacts that are expected to be associated with the proposed amendments identified in this Addendum.

No additional significant impacts beyond those identified in the county's EIS for the Comprehensive Plan 2015 Update are expected to occur. No additional programmatic level environmental review will be required to the extent that the existing environmental documents listed in this addendum or other published documents have analyzed such changes.
