<u>Section 1.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.010, last amended by Ordinance No. 05-123 on November 9, 2005, is amended to read:

2.36.010 Purposes.

The purposes of this chapter are to provide for the preparation and carrying out of plans for emergency services in the event of an emergency or disaster, for the coordination of the emergency services of this county with <u>and rendering of mutual aid among the political subdivisions of the state</u>, other public agencies and affected private persons, corporations and organizations, for the exercise of emergency powers by the county executive, for the establishment of the Snohomish county department of emergency management <u>to ensure the most effective coordination and preparation of the area's workforce, resources and facilities</u>, and for the continuity of county government, in a manner consistent with the Washington Emergency Management Act, Chapter <u>38.52</u> RCW, and the Continuity of Government Act, Chapter <u>42.14</u> RCW. Any county expenditures made in connection with such emergency services, including mutual aid activities and mock or practice drills, shall be deemed conclusively to be for the direct protection and benefit of the inhabitants and property of the county of Snohomish.

<u>Section 2.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.020, last amended by Ordinance No. 05-123 on November 9, 2005, is amended to read:

2.36.020 Definitions.

- In this chapter, unless the context clearly requires otherwise,
- (1) "Advisory Board" means the emergency management advisory board established pursuant to SCC <u>2.36.100</u>.
- (2) <u>"Coordinating committee" means the emergency management coordinating committee established pursuant to SCC 2.36.085.</u>
- 42 (3) "County personnel system" means those statements of policy and procedure contained in title 3A SCC and amendments thereto.
- (((3))) <u>(4)</u> "Department" means the Snohomish county department of emergency management.

- 9 $((\frac{(6)}{(6)}))$ "Emergency management" means the preparation for and the carrying out of
- all emergency functions, other than functions for which military forces are primarily
- responsible, to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies and
- disasters, and to aid victims suffering from injury or damage, resulting from disasters
- caused by all hazards, whether natural, technological, or human caused, and to provide
- support for search and rescue operations for persons and property in distress <u>pursuant</u>
- to the provisions of Chapter 38.52 RCW. ((It does not mean preparation for emergency

- 16 evacuation or relocation of residents in anticipation of nuclear attack.))
- (((7))) (8) "Executive head" and "executive heads" means the county executive and in
- the case of cities and towns, it means the mayor in those cities and towns with a mayor-
- council or commission form of government where the mayor is directly elected, and it
- 20 means the city manager in those cities and towns with a council-manager form of
- government. In the case of tribes, "executive head" means the tribal ((chairman))
- 22 <u>chairperson</u>.
- 23 $((\frac{8}{}))$ (9) "Exempt personnel system" means the conditions of employment under the provisions of chapter 3.68 SCC and amendments thereto.
- 25 (10) "Immediate aftermath" means the period of time immediately following an
 - emergency or disaster during which emergency responders can reasonably expect to save lives or property.

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<u>Section 3.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.030, last amended by Ordinance No. 05-123 on November 9, 2005, is amended to read:

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2.36.030 Powers and duties of county executive.

- (1) Except as otherwise provided by state law or the county charter, the county executive shall have general supervision and control of emergency <u>management</u> services provided by the county <u>and</u>, in the event of an emergency or disaster, ((and)) shall be responsible for implementing the Washington Emergency Management Act, Chapter <u>38.52</u> RCW, <u>and the provisions of chapter 2.36 SCC</u> on behalf of the county. (2) In performing the executive's duties under this chapter, the county executive is further authorized and empowered to:
 - (a) Delegate county emergency management functions to the director of the Snohomish county department of emergency management appointed pursuant to SCC 2.36.060, subject to supervision by the county executive;
 - (b) ((Develop and implement emergency evacuation and other procedures for county government, consistent with the approved county comprehensive emergency management plan;)) Foster cooperative planning across all levels of county government to enable efficient and uniform approaches to the

coordination of multiagency and multijurisdictional actions for the county's
 mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery efforts;

- (c) Coordinate county emergency management functions with federal, state and local organizations for emergency management to promote effective preparation and use of manpower, resources, and facilities;
- (d) In collaboration with ((appropriate public or private agencies)) cities, other counties, state governments, the provinces of the Dominion of Canada and the federal government, provide for the rendering of mutual aid and prepare and present to the county council for approval agreements providing for mutual aid in the event of an emergency or disaster;
- (e) Issue emergency or disaster proclamations <u>pursuant to SCC 2.36.040</u>, for obtaining state and federal assistance and for other purposes as authorized by law; ((and))
- (f) Prepare a comprehensive plan and program for the emergency management of the county pursuant to state law and SCC 2.36.055, and submit the plan and program, including but not limited to elements addressing mitigation activities, preparedness, responses to disasters and emergencies, and recovery operations, to the state director of emergency management for the director's recommendations thereto and certification for consistency with the state comprehensive emergency management plan in order to ensure that local emergency operations are coordinated with the state plan and program; (g) Provide a means of compensating emergency workers pursuant to RCW 38.52.210;
- (h) Facilitate the local emergency planning committee for Snohomish County as referenced in federal Title III, the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986, as amended; and
- (i) Take such other actions as are provided for the executive head of a political subdivision by the Washington Emergency Management Act, Chapter 38.52 RCW.
- (3) ((The county executive shall approve and revise as necessary county comprehensive emergency management plans prepared by the Snohomish county department of emergency management pursuant to SCC 2.36.050. The executive shall promptly distribute approved or revised plans to the council and affected county agencies.)) In implementing the provisions of this chapter, the county executive is directed to use the services, equipment, supplies, and facilities of existing departments, offices and agencies of the county to the maximum extent practicable.

<u>Section 4.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.040, last amended by Ordinance No. 05-123 on November 9, 2005, is amended to read:

2.36.040 Emergency or ((Disaster)) disaster proclamation--specific powers of the executive.

(1) Whenever an emergency or disaster occurs in Snohomish County and results in the death or injury of persons, the destruction of property, and/or threatens the environment, to such an extent as to require, in the judgment of the executive,

- extraordinary measures to protect the public peace, safety and welfare, the executive
 may proclaim in writing the existence of such an emergency.
- 3 (2) Any proclamation issued by the executive pursuant to the authority of this chapter
- 4 shall be delivered to all news media within Snohomish County and shall utilize such
- other available means as are necessary, in the executive's judgment, to give notice of
 such proclamation to the public.
 - (3) In the event of ((disaster)) such proclamation as herein provided, the county executive is hereby empowered:
 - (((1))) (a) To issue, amend, and rescind ((rules and regulations)) orders on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property as affected by such disaster including but not limited to: ((; PROVIDED, That such rules and regulations shall be published at least once in such form as the executive finds reasonable under the circumstances, shall be available for public inspection at the Snohomish county department of emergency management, and shall expire at the end of thirty days after issuance unless enacted by ordinance))
 - (i) An order directing evacuation or clearing of debris and wreckage caused by an emergency or disaster from publicly and privately owned lands and waters;
 - (ii) An order imposing and modifying a general curfew applicable to Snohomish County as a whole, or to any geographical area or areas of Snohomish County during any hours, as the executive deems necessary; (iii) An order requiring any or all business establishments to close and remain closed until a further order;
 - (iv) An order closing to the public any or all public places including streets, alleys, public ways, schools, parks, beaches, amusement areas and public buildings;
 - (v) An order temporarily suspending Snohomish County permit procedures for public work projects, as defined by RCW 39.04.010, responding to conditions of the emergency or for restoration of public facilities damages as a result of the emergency, PROVIDED, that all projects must comply with all applicable code requirements; and
 - (vi) Any other orders as are imminently necessary for the protection of life and property;
 - (((2))) (b) To approve contracts and incur obligations necessary to combat such disaster, and in light of the exigencies of an extreme emergency situation without regard to time-consuming procedures and formalities prescribed by law (except mandatory constitutional requirements), as provided in RCW 38.52.070(2); (((3))) (c) After proclamation ((by the governor)) of the existence of such emergency or disaster, to command the service and equipment of as many citizens as considered necessary in light of the disaster proclaimed: PROVIDED, that citizens so commandeered shall be entitled during the period of such service to all privileges, benefits and immunities as are provided by federal and state law for registered emergency workers, as provided in RCW 38.52.110(2);
 - (((4))) (d) To execute all of the special powers conferred upon the executive by this chapter, by statute, or by any other lawful authority; and

(((5))) <u>(e)</u> To requisition necessary personnel or material of any county department or agency.

(4) Any orders issued by the executive pursuant to this chapter shall be published at least once in such form as the executive finds reasonable under the circumstances, filed with the clerk of the council not later than 10:00 a.m. of the second business day after issuance, shall be available for public inspection at the Snohomish county department of emergency management, and shall expire at the end of thirty days after issuance or amendment, whichever is later, unless enacted or terminated by ordinance.

(5) Upon finding that the conditions or circumstances giving rise to an emergency or disaster proclamation issued by the executive have subsided, the county council may terminate such proclamation by ordinance if at least 30 days have elapsed since the date the proclamation issued.

<u>Section 5.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.050, last amended by Ordinance No. 05-123 on November 9, 2005, is amended to read:

2.36.050 Department of emergency management - creation and authority.

- (1) The Snohomish county department of emergency management ("department") is hereby established. The administration <u>and operation</u> of the department is the responsibility of the ((county executive)) <u>director</u>.
- (2) The department shall implement policies and procedures and administer programs which provide for the preparation and carrying out of plans for emergency services in the event of an emergency or disaster, and for the coordination of the emergency services of this county with other public agencies and affected private persons, corporations and organizations. The department shall be the lead coordinating agency to ensure county-wide compliance with local, state and federal laws, regulations and guidelines relating to emergency preparedness, including the adoption of the National Incident Management System as required by the Homeland Security Act of 2002.
- (3) The department's functions and responsibilities shall include but not be limited to the following:
 - (a) ((Management)) Manage and ((administration)) administer ((of)) the county's emergency management program as provided in this chapter;
 - (b) ((Preparation)) Prepare and ((presentation to the county executive for approval of a)) maintain the county comprehensive emergency management plan, ((consistent with the state comprehensive emergency management plan)) as described in SCC 2.36.055;
 - (c) <u>Maintain the operational readiness of Snohomish County's emergency</u> coordination center including the development of policies and procedures that direct the activities of the personnel staffing the emergency coordination center and for authorizing the deployment of county resources or actions, including emergency permits;
 - (d) ((Coordination of county)) Coordinate other emergency ((services)) management activities with other public agencies and affected private persons, corporations and organization, subject to the authority of the county executive; and

Section 6. A new section is added to chapter 2.36 of the Snohomish County Code to read:

2.36.055 County comprehensive emergency management plan.

- (1) The department shall develop and maintain a comprehensive, all-hazard emergency plan, consistent with the state comprehensive emergency management plan, which shall be based on an analysis of the natural, technological or human caused hazards that could affect Snohomish County, and shall include the procedures to be used during emergencies for coordinating the resources of all county departments and elected offices, and all local resources, as necessary.
- (2) Every five years the department shall present to the executive for approval an updated comprehensive emergency management plan, which the executive shall revise as necessary and approve. The executive shall promptly distribute approved or revised plans to the council and affected county departments and elected offices.
- (3) In accordance with the county emergency management plan, the executive may procure supplies and equipment, institute professional and public training programs and public information and educational programs, manage and coordinate disaster drills, and take all other preparatory steps including but not limited to the full or partial activation of the county's emergency coordination center and mobilization of other emergency management resources in advance of an actual disaster to ensure the furnishing of emergency management personnel in time of need.

<u>Section 7.</u> A new section is added to chapter 2.36 of the Snohomish County Code to read:

2.36.065 Emergency and disaster powers of director.

- (1) The director is empowered to request the county executive or, in his/her absence, the temporary interim successor, to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of an emergency or disaster and termination thereof, and the director may further issue such proclamation if the county executive or the temporary interim successor is not available, subject to confirmation by the county executive at the earliest practicable time.
- (2) When, in the opinion of the director, the resources of the area or region are inadequate to cope with the disaster, the director is empowered to request the county executive or, in his/her absence, the temporary interim successor, to request the governor to proclaim a state of emergency, and the director may further make such request if the county executive or the temporary interim successor is not available, subject to confirmation by the county executive at the earliest practicable time.

 (3) In the event of a proclamation as provided in this section or a presidential
- (3) In the event of a proclamation as provided in this section or a presidential emergency or major disaster declaration, the director is empowered:
 - (a) To issue, amend, and rescind orders on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property as affected by such disaster as provided for in SCC

- <u>2.36.040</u> and subject to confirmation by the county executive, or temporary interim successor, at the earliest practicable time;
 - (b) Subject to the approval of the executive or, in his/her absence, the temporary interim successor if available, to approve contracts and incur obligations necessary to combat such disaster, and in light of the exigencies of an extreme emergency situation without regard to time-consuming procedures and formalities prescribed by law (except mandatory constitutional requirements), as provided in RCW 38.52.070(2); PROVIDED, that in the immediate aftermath of an emergency or disaster, and in order to facilitate the availability of life-saving resources, the director may approve contracts and incur obligations up to \$2,000,000, subject to confirmation by the county executive, or temporary interim successor, at the earliest practicable time;
 - (c) After proclamation by the governor of the existence of such disaster, to command the service and equipment of as many citizens as considered necessary in light of the disaster proclaimed; PROVIDED, that citizens so commandeered shall be entitled during the period of such service to all privileges, benefits and immunities as are provided by federal and state law for registered emergency workers, as provided in RCW 38.52.110(2); and (d) To requisition necessary personnel or material of any county department or

<u>Section 8.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.075, added by Ordinance No. 02-104 on January 8, 2003, is amended to read:

2.36.075 Continuity of county government.

agency.

- (1) In accordance with Chapter <u>42.14</u> RCW, the continued operation of county government shall be assured in the event of ((enemy attack)) an emergency or disaster as follows:
 - (a) If ((enemy attack)) the emergency or disaster reduces the number of members of the county council, then those members who are available for duty shall have full authority to act in all matters as the county council. In the event no member of the county council is available for duty, then those elected county officials as are available for duty shall jointly act as the county council and shall possess by majority vote the full authority of the county council.
 - (b) If the executive is unavailable, the powers and duties of the office shall be discharged by the following officers in the following order:
 - (i) Deputy executive;
 - (ii) Director of the department.
 - (c) Elected county officers, other than the executive and members of the county council, are authorized and directed to designate one or more temporary interim successors to the office of such officer in the event the officer is unavailable for duty during an emergency ((caused by enemy attack)) or disaster.
 - (((c))) <u>(d)</u> The county executive shall, subject to such rules as the executive may adopt, permit each appointed county officer to designate one or more temporary interim successors of such officer in the event the officer is unavailable for duty during an emergency ((caused by enemy attack)) <u>or disaster</u>.

- (2) Any county officer succeeding to an office on a temporary interim basis pursuant to this section shall discharge the duties of that office only until such time as the elected or appointed officer is available for duty or a regular successor is appointed by the ordinary means applicable to the office.
- (3) In this section, the ((term "attack" means any act of warfare taken by an enemy of the United States causing substantial damage or injury to persons or property in the United States and in the state of Washington. The)) term "unavailable" means either that a vacancy in the office exists or that the lawful incumbent of the office is absent or unable to exercise the powers and discharge the duties of the office following ((an attack and)) a declaration of existing emergency by the governor or the governor's successor.

Section 9. A new section is added to chapter 2.36 of the Snohomish County Code to read:

2.36.080 County department and elected official office continuity of operations planning.

Each county department and elected official office shall draft, implement, maintain and annually exercise a continuity of operations plan that ensures the readiness of the individual department or office and its employees to respond to and recover from an emergency or disaster. The department will coordinate with each individual department and elected office on annual exercises. Each such individual department or office plan and any related procedures will support the county comprehensive emergency management plan, including performance of any tasks assigned therein to the individual department or office. Each county department and elected official office shall update its continuity of operations plan every five years as part of the update to the county's comprehensive emergency management plan, as described in SCC 2.36.055. The department shall coordinate with and provide each individual county department and elected official office with a form continuity of operations plan.

Section 10. A new section is added to chapter 2.36 of the Snohomish County Code to read:

2.36.085 Snohomish county emergency management coordinating committee.

(1) The Snohomish county emergency management coordinating committee is hereby established. Except as otherwise provided by state law, the committee shall be the coordinating body for emergency management issues concerning Snohomish County government. The committee shall act in an advisory capacity to the office of emergency management to promote, advise, assist and review emergency management issues and to enhance preparedness for Snohomish County employees and the departments and elected offices that they serve, on behalf of the county's residents and other constituents.

- 1 (2) The committee shall be composed of members drawn from within Snohomish
- 2 County government and may include, but not be limited to, at least one representative
- from the county council, each county department and elected office, and the office of
- emergency management, as determined appropriate by the head of each department or elected office.
 - (3) The committee shall:

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- (a) Address issues and concerns relating to emergency preparedness, planning and response brought forward by members on behalf of the department or elected office they represent;
- (b) Assist in the review, development and maintenance of the Snohomish County comprehensive emergency management plan;
- (c) Assist in the review, development and maintenance of department and elected office continuity of operations plans;
- (d) Participate in strategic planning to identify and document objectives that will strengthen resilience; and
- (d) Assist in the review, development and maintenance of any other plans, programs, rules and policies concerning emergency management, as requested by the department of emergency management and consistent with state law.
- (4) The department of emergency management shall provide staffing, develop work plans and provide other resources to effectively support the work of the committee and its activities.
- (5) The work of the committee shall be provided to the executive and the council annually, as part of the department of emergency management's annual report.

<u>Section 11.</u> Snohomish County Code Section 2.36.110, added by Ordinance No. 05-123 on November 9, 2005, is amended to read:

2.36.110 Composition of the board.

- (1) The advisory board shall be composed of one member from each city, town or tribe that contracts with the county through an interlocal agreement for emergency management services.
- ((Additionally, the)) (2) The director will participate as an ex officio representative to the advisory board, serving as a liaison between the county and the members, but will not be a voting member.
- $((\frac{(2)}{2}))$ (3) The initial member for each contracting city, town or tribe shall be the city, town or tribes executive head.
- (((3))) (4) The executive head of any <u>contracting</u> city, town or tribe may designate an alternate representative to the advisory board, such designation to be made in a writing delivered to the county prior to the meeting at which the alternate will be entitled to vote.
- 40 (((4))) (5) ((One representative of each city or town within the county that has
- 41 established a local organization performing emergency management services in
