




Richardson Creek Bridge 300 Bridge Replacement

Richardson Creek Bridge was built in 1961 and does not support the traffic needs of the area.



The new proposed bridge (similar to Bridge 504 over Swamp Creek shown above) will feature a wider deck for improved accessibility.



About the Project

Richardson Creek Bridge #300 on Woods Creek Road just east of Monroe is planned for replacement in 2021-2022. The proposed replacement bridge will include sidewalks and bike lanes for improved mobility. In addition, the longer bridge span will better accommodate flood waters and improve fish passage.

Snohomish County Public Works is in the preliminary stages of design and is seeking community input on two construction proposals.

Option 1

Provide a full road closure that is safer for construction and has less environmental impacts, but requires detouring all traffic around the project site. This option shortens the construction timeline (3-4 months) and reduces project costs, but may add travel time and diverts drivers on local roads. The proposed detour route utilizes Ingraham Road, 132nd St. SE and Wagner Road.

Option 2

Build the bridge in two stages, one half at a time. This staged construction option maintains a single lane of traffic through construction, which may reduce the daily impact to commuters. The option would double construction time (7-8 months), add costs, and increase impacts to the environment.

Funding

The total project cost is estimated at approximately \$2.1 million. Snohomish County has secured funding for the project, which includes

- 85% federal funding from the Surface Transportation Program (STP)
- 15% from the Snohomish County Roads Fund

Schedule

Present – 2021

- Design
- Survey
- Environment Review
- Right-of-Way Acquisitions, if applicable

Late 2021 – 2022

- Construction
Note: This project is in the early design phase. Anticipated design elements and construction schedules are subject to change as additional project development continues.

Next Steps

- **Open House Project Feedback:** After the comment period closes October 31, the project team will take your input into account when planning.
- **Environmental Review Feedback:** A SEPA environmental review will be conducted where the public will have an opportunity to comment. An additional opportunity for comment will also follow the project's application for a Shoreline Substantial Development Permit.
