Arlington School District No. 16 Proposition No. 1

Renewal of Expiring Educational Programs and Operations Levy

The Board of Directors of Arlington School District No. 16 adopted Resolution No. 19-11, concerning a proposition to support educational programs and operations expenses. This proposition would authorize the District to levy the following excess taxes, renewing an expiring levy, on all taxable property within the District, for educational programs and operations expenses not funded by the State (including instructional services and support, facility maintenance, technology, special education and extracurricular activities):

Capital Levy for Safety and Security Improvements and High School Classrooms

The Board of Directors of Arlington School District No. 16 adopted Resolution No. 19-12, concerning a proposition for a levy for capital improvements. This proposition would authorize the District to levy the following excess taxes, on all taxable property within the District, for making District-wide safety, security and infrastructure improvements (including fire sprinklers, heating, ventilation, air conditioning and traffic safety) and constructing additional classrooms and a technology workshop at Arlington High School:

Arlington School District No. 16 Proposition No. 3

Bonds to Construct a New Post Middle School

The Board of Directors of Arlington School District No. 16 adopted Resolution No. 19-13, concerning a proposition to replace an aging and educationally outdated school. This proposition would authorize the District to: construct a new middle school to replace Post Middle School that will include general classrooms, Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics classrooms, special education resource rooms, band and music rooms, stage, kitchen, commons, library, gymnasiums, and outdoor physical education/athletic fields; issue no more than \$71,500,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 21 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 19-13.

Darrington School District No. 330 Proposition No. 1

Supplemental Educational Programs and Operation Levy

The Board of Directors of Darrington School District No. 330 adopted Resolution No. 392-11-19, concerning supplemental funding for educational programs and operation. This proposition would authorize the District, in response to recent legislative changes, to levy the following excess taxes to supplement the existing levies approved by the voters on April 24, 2018, on all taxable property within the District, for support of the District's educational programs and operation expenses not funded by the State:

Capital Improvement and School Construction General Obligation Bonds - \$600,000,000

The Board of Directors of Edmonds School District No. 15 adopted Resolution No. 19-31 concerning a proposition to finance capital improvements to its education facilities. This proposition would authorize the District to complete the improvements to Spruce Elementary School, replace College Place Middle School, replace Oak Heights and Beverly elementary schools, build a new elementary school and a new middle school and construct a new Innovative Learning Center; issue \$600,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 21 years; and levy annual excess property tax levies to pay such bonds, as provided in Resolution No. 19-31.

This proposition would authorize the District to construct additions to and/or partially replace five elementary schools, a middle and high school to accommodate growth; install District-wide safety and security improvements; and make technology, modernization and energy efficiency capital improvements to the facilities of the District, by issuing \$240,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 21 years; and to levy excess property taxes annually to repay the bonds, as described in Resolution #1/2019-20.

Bonds to Replace and Renovate Schools and Improve Safety

The Board of Directors of Snohomish School District No. 201 adopted Resolution No. 13-19, concerning a proposition to replace and renovate schools and improve safety. This proposition would authorize the District to: replace Cascade View, Cathcart, Dutch Hill, Seattle Hill, Totem Falls and Emerson Elementary Schools and Maintenance Center; renovate Central Primary Center, Parkway Campus and Transportation Facility; add classrooms to Glacier Peak; make District-wide safety/security and other capital improvements; acquire land; issue no more than \$470,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 21 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. 13-19.

Fire District 15 Proposition No. 1

Restore Property Tax Levy for Emergency Medical Services

The Board of Fire Commissioners of Fire Protection District No. 15, Snohomish County, Washington, adopted Resolution No. 2019-18 concerning a proposition to restore Emergency Medical Services funding. This measure would restore the District's regular property tax levy for Emergency Medical Services to \$0.50 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation for collection in 2021 and would authorize an annual increase in the limit factor of up to 6% (but not to exceed the \$0.50 rate) for each of the five succeeding years. The maximum allowable levy in 2025, collected in 2026, shall serve as the base for subsequent levy limitations as provided by Chapter 84.55 RCW.
